#### A Note From the Executive Director



Dear Friends,

In my over 20 years with URR, I have seen countless survivors access programs and services that have changed their lives. It is inspiring to be in the presence of their strength, and I am humbled by the obstacles they overcome every single day. Their successes would not be possible without the continued

support we receive from our community, state, and federal funders, including grants from the Office of Violence Against Women (OVW), made available through the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA). Here is just one example of the impact those grants make on local lives:

Ten months ago, Keneesha entered our emergency Homeless since leaving her abusive boyfriend, Keneesha was pregnant, and only one week from her due date. She had no family in the except for her three year old son and his tattered, stuffed monkey named Boots. In emergency shelter, Keneesha was provided transportation to her final doctor's appointments, while her son and Boots were kept safe and happy in our on-site daycare. Following a stable delivery, Keneesha, her son, and new Baby Kira, were accepted into our transitional housing program to finally build a home of their own. Kira and her brother now spend court-ordered time with their father in URR's SafePlace program which provides monitored visitation, and offers books, games, and activities for children and their non-custodial parent. Keneesha is now working to become a CNA, as she "hopes to one day give back to the community that helped her so much."

Without the funding provided by OVW's VAWA grants, Keneesha's story could have been very different. At any given time, VAWA funding allows 6 families to remain safe and stable in transitional housing. It provides free, licensed daycare for up to 20 children at a time, while their parents receive supportive services. And it gives 20 families time to play and connect in a safe environment through our SafePlace program.

It is because of grants like VAWA, and because of YOUR unwavering belief in the importance of our work, that so many Saginaw County lives have been transformed.

Please, please keep believing.

### STAND UP AGAINST SEXISM.

Stand up against rape culture. Find your voice. Find out how to amplify the voices of women and survivors. Ask yourself if you are making a safer space for women in your life to find support. What are you reinforcing or silently supporting?



# LEARN ABOUT THE STRUGGLES THAT HAVE COME BEFORE YOU.

Learn more about power and privilege. Talk to other anti-sexist men about how they confront male privilege.



# PREPARE TO MAKE MISTAKES.

Prepare to apologize. Prepare to listen and learn again, and again. Be aware of how much space you take up in the conversation.



## LOOK INTO YOUR OWN LIFE.

Where do you have power? How have you used this power in the past? Manhood does not equal domination. Use the position you have to help make space for others to empower themselves. Inspire other men to consider consequences and embrace role modelling.



# CREATE THE WORLD WE WANT.

Create a space for men to talk, heal from sexism and take action. Encourage men to strive towards being difference-makers, embracing the power we have and the actions we can take. We are creating our world, in both the BIG actions, and also how we treat each other day to day.

All proceeds stay local to fund services for Saginaw County survivors of abuse.



My favorite thing about GOTR was meeting new people and new friends from other schools. It was good to know that there was no pressure to be the best - just have fun and work at your own speed. When I finished the 5k for the first time I felt amazing. I was so little and didn't think I could do it. I was surprised when I did! So every year after that I told myself that, if I could do it at that young age, I could do it as I got older. Over the 4 seasons I have grown by becoming more confident in things I didn't know I can do. I felt important and part of something special. I was with other girls who were all doing the same thing. I also became a little less shy. I would tell a young girl that never participated in GOTR to just do her best, have fun, make new friends. You don't have to be an athlete to join because I wasn't. You don't have to be the fastest or the winner because everybody is a winner in this.

I liked keeping Angelica involved in GOTR because it made me happy to see her happy. She felt like she was part of a team. She liked knowing that she fit in with her peers and they were all reaching for the same goal. Her teammates became her friends. She grew so independent and confident. When she first started, she didn't like running, walking, or any physical activity, but once she got out there she surprised me and herself. At her last 5k, I noticed that she stayed behind to walk with a younger student. It showed how much she cared and understood the other girls. I was excited about GOTR every year. It almost made me feel like a kid again myself. We could practice together, and it was quality time with my daughter. We talked while we walked and then set goals to run certain distances. It made me proud to see the pride she had in herself.
